

What is AUGTYRO?

AUGTYRO (repotrectinib) is an oral prescription medicine used to treat adults with **non-small cell lung cancer** (NSCLC) that:

- ✓ Has spread within your chest or to other parts of the body AND
- ✓ Is caused by an abnormal *ROS1* gene.

It is not known if AUGTYRO is safe and effective in children with ROS1-positive NSCLC.



Talk to your healthcare team for more information about what it means to have an abnormal ROS1 gene.

SUMMARY OF WARNINGS AND PRECAUTIONS

AUGTYRO (repotrectinib) may cause serious side effects, including central nervous system (CNS) effects, lung problems (pneumonitis), liver problems, muscle problems, increased uric acid level in your blood (hyperuricemia), and bone fractures.

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People with *ROS1*+ lung cancer **tend to be younger** (about age 50) than lung cancer patients in general (age 70) and have **little to no smoking history**.



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ARE YOU READY FOR THIS?

A lung cancer diagnosis may undoubtedly catch you off guard, especially *ROS1*+ non-small cell lung cancer, a rare form of lung cancer. It may bring about uncertainty and fill your head with questions. The following pages offer guidance for a next step, which may involve a treatment tailored to help fight *ROS1*+ lung cancer in pill form—AUGTYRO, a treatment that may help lung tumors shrink or disappear (see page 5 for more information).

Look to this guide and your healthcare team for answers. You may start at the beginning and learn about an oral, chemo-free treatment, tailored for *ROS1*+ lung cancer. Or, jump to other sections about side effects, dosing, and support. It's important to learn how AUGTYRO works differently than chemotherapy by targeting your cancer. It's a treatment designed to find certain cancer cells and help turn off their growth signals.

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1%-2% of adults with non-small cell lung cancer are diagnosed with *ROS1*+ lung cancer.

START WITH A TREATMENT TARGETED FOR ROS1

People with ROS1+ non-small cell lung cancer, like yourself, can be treated with AUGTYRO as their first targeted therapy.

In a study, 71 people with *ROS1*+ lung cancer were given AUGTYRO as their first targeted therapy. They received AUGTYRO starting at 160 mg orally once daily for 14 days, and then their dose was increased to 160 mg twice daily until their doctor recommended otherwise.



AUGTYRO has been shown to provide results for people with *ROS1*+ lung cancer.



AUGTYRO, taken orally in pill form, is tailored to treat *ROS1*+ lung cancer. Response to treatment may vary.

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Study Results

in people given AUGTYRO as their first targeted therapy

Nearly 3 YEARS

Half of the people taking AUGTYRO were still responding to treatment at 34 months.

Less than 2 MONTHS

For some, AUGTYRO started showing positive effects in people in a range of 1.4+, 42.4+ months.

Of 71 people with ROS1+ NSCLC who participated in the study				
Tumors disappeared* (Complete response)	6 %			
Tumors shrank (Partial response)	73 %			
Tumors shrank or disappeared* (Overall response)	79 %			

Individual experience may vary. Some may notice improvements sooner or later than the average time frame. If tumors disappear during treatment, continuing treatment is still necessary.

*The disappearance of many measurable tumors in response to treatments does not necessarily mean the cancer has been cured.

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NOT ALL LUNG CANCERS ARE THE SAME.

To determine your specific type, your cancer may have been tested for a unique marker, called a biomarker. Some non-small cell lung cancers, like yours, test positive for *ROS1*.* While your diagnosis is a rare type of lung cancer, knowing your biomarker helped your doctor determine that AUGTYRO may be right for you.

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^{*}An error in the *ROS1* gene is one biomarker that doctors look for in non-small cell lung cancer.

BIOMARKERS MAY HAVE THE DETAILS



Biomarkers (also called tumor markers) can offer valuable insight into your cancer. They are determined through biomarker testing. This is when your doctor checks a blood or tissue sample for certain genes, proteins, or other markers that could be a sign of a specific disease or cancer.

Here's why knowing your biomarker is important:

- Biomarkers give you and your doctor details about your cancer so that your doctor can accurately diagnose it.
- They help determine the best plan of action. Think of biomarkers as keys that help you and your doctor unlock treatment options.



All in all, biomarker testing (also referred to as tumor testing or molecular testing) helped you and your doctor determine that you have *ROS1*+ lung cancer and that **AUGTYRO may be an effective treatment for you.**

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WHAT TYPE OF TREATMENT IS AUGTYRO® (repotrectinib)?

AUGTYRO is a targeted therapy tailored specifically to treat *ROS1*+ lung cancer. It's a prescription oral treatment that's designed to help identify certain cancer cells, and shut off their "grow" signals.

AUGTYRO is not chemotherapy it's a targeted ROS1 treatment.



AUGTYRO is a targeted therapy which means it zeroes in on ROS1 proteins. Most types of targeted therapies like AUGTYRO help fight specific proteins that cause tumors to grow and spread throughout the body.

AUGTYRO is a precise way of helping fight *ROS1*+ lung cancer.

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TAKING AUGTYRO® (repotrectinib)



For the first 14 days, you will start with a dose of 1 pill a day until your doctor recommends otherwise.



On Day 15, you will start taking 1 pill in the morning and 1 pill in the evening every day until your doctor recommends otherwise.

A **40-mg dosing** option is also available.

Take AUGTYRO as directed

If you miss a dose or vomit at any time after taking a dose of AUGTYRO, do not take an extra dose. Take your next dose at the regularly scheduled time. Do not take 2 doses at the same time to make up a missed or vomited dose.



AUGTYRO treats *ROS1*+ lung cancer with an oral treatment in pill form that you can take from the comfort of your home.



AUGTYRO may be taken with or without food. It should be swallowed whole with water at about the same time each day as prescribed. Avoid eating grapefruit or drinking grapefruit juice during your treatment with AUGTYRO. Remember not to open, crush, chew, or dissolve the capsule. Do not take a capsule if it is broken, cracked, or damaged.



From Day 1 to Day 14, your doctor will start you on a once-daily dose. Starting on Day 15, the dose may be increased to twice daily.



If you are experiencing any side effects, see page 12 for details and contact your care team. Your healthcare team will work closely with you to help manage these side effects with changes in dosing. In some cases they may temporarily or permanently stop treatment.

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STICKING TO YOUR SCHEDULE

It's necessary to take AUGTYRO as prescribed by your doctor.
This will help enable your treatment to be effective as you fight *ROS1*+ lung cancer. Below are ways to help you remember to take a dose:

Develop a routine



Take AUGTYRO at about the same time each day to make it easier to remember. For example, at 8 AM and 8 PM. Or maybe before you brush your teeth in the morning and before you brush at night.

~

Give yourself a reminder

Place a note where you're likely to see it or set an alarm on your phone.



Use a child-resistant pill box

Keep track of your dosing schedule with a pill box labeled with the days of the week.



Record each dose

Use a calendar to check off when you've taken AUGTYRO each day.



Be prepared when traveling

Carry your AUGTYRO with you.

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POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS TO LOOK OUT FOR

Now that you've learned how AUGTYRO works, adjusting to your new "normal" may involve side effects. It's important to be mindful, track changes, and assess how you're feeling.

Rely on your care team

To have helpful conversations with them, remember to let your team know if you are experiencing any new or different symptoms at any time during your treatment.

AUGTYRO may cause serious side effects, including:

- Central nervous system (CNS) effects
- Lung problems (pneumonitis)
- Liver problems
- Muscle problems
- Increased uric acid in your blood (hyperuricemia)
- Bone fractures

The most common side effects of AUGTYRO include:

- Dizziness
- · Change in sense of taste
- Feeling of numbness or tingling in your arms or legs
- Constipation
- · Shortness of breath
- Tiredness
- Trouble with balance, coordination, and walking
- Problems with thinking, such as forgetfulness or confusion, memory problems and hallucinations
- Muscle weakness
- Nausea

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The most common side effect? Dizziness.

If at any point in your treatment you experience dizziness, let your healthcare team know. Do not drive or operate machinery until you know how AUGTYRO affects you. If you experience dizziness, do not drive or operate machinery until your symptoms have resolved.

Here are some things you can do that may help manage dizziness:



Drink plenty of fluids daily. Aim for 8 to 12 eight-ounce glasses of water or other fluids every day.



Avoid drinking a lot of caffeinated beverages including coffee, tea, and soda.



Avoid moving suddenly. For example, sit up carefully from a lying position. If you get dizzy when you stand up, hold a chair or table for balance and stand up more slowly than usual.



Sit or lie down immediately. The possibility of losing your balance could lead to falling or serious injury.

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WHAT TO DISCUSS WITH YOUR DOCTOR

Understandably, you may still have some questions about *ROS1*+ lung cancer, AUGTYRO, or both. Here are some questions you can discuss with your doctor. There is also room on this page for any additional notes you want to remember later.

- How does AUGTYRO work?
- Do you think AUGTYRO will help me?
- What are the potential side effects that I may experience?
- How often will I need scans or follow-up visits during treatment?
- How will I know if AUGTYRO is working?

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HOW TO GET AUGTYRO

You can get AUGTYRO through certain specialty pharmacies that handle treatments, including AUGTYRO, which are not stocked at regular neighborhood pharmacies.

Most specialty pharmacies deliver medications by mail.

Here are some steps your doctor's office and the specialty pharmacy must do before AUGTYRO can be shipped to you:

- Make sure that your health insurance plan has approved AUGTYRO.
- Discuss shipping details with you.
- · Collect your co-pay.



Your specialty pharmacy will call to confirm the above details. Make sure you save their number in your phone so you can answer right away or return their calls. This will help you get your AUGTYRO treatment on time.

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



This is a summary of important information that you need to know about AUGTYRO. Your healthcare team can work with you to help answer any questions you may have about this medication. Keep this document in a safe place, so you can refer to it before and during your treatment.

Helpful information to remember

What is AUGTYRO?

AUGTYRO (repotrectinib) is an oral prescription medicine used to treat adults with non-small cell lung cancer (NSCLC) that:

- ✓ Is caused by an abnormal ROS1 gene.

It is not known if AUGTYRO is safe and effective in children with ROS1-positive NSCLC.

What is the most important information I should know about AUGTYRO?

AUGTYRO may cause serious side effects. A serious side effect is a side effect that can sometimes become life-threatening and can lead to death. The serious side effects of AUGTYRO may include:

Central nervous system (CNS) problems. Symptoms to look out for include:

- · dizziness
- vertigo
- · changes in mood, such as anxiety, irritability, and depression
- balance or coordination problems
- problems with thinking, such as forgetfulness or confusion
- seeing or hearing things that are not real (hallucinations)
- · problems with concentration, attention, memory, and sleep



Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any of these symptoms, or any worsening of CNS effects during treatment.

Lung problems (pneumonitis). AUGTYRO may cause pneumonitis (inflammation of the lungs), which may be severe or serious. New or worsening symptoms to look out for include:

- Dry cough (without mucus)
- Productive cough (with mucus)
- Wheezing
- Trouble breathing



🗨 🖊 Call your healthcare provider right away if you have any of these symptoms, or any worsening of your current lung problems.

Liver problems. Your healthcare provider will do blood tests to check your liver function before starting treatment with AUGTYRO™, every 2 weeks for the first month, and as needed during treatment. Symptoms of liver problems include:

- your skin or the white part of your eyes turns yellow dark or "tea-colored" urine
- · light-colored stools (bowel movements)
- nausea or vomiting

- loss of appetite
- · pain on the upper right side of your



Call your healthcare provider right away if you develop any of these symptoms of liver problems.

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Muscle problems. Your healthcare provider will do blood tests before starting treatment with AUGTYRO, every 2 weeks for the first month, and as needed during treatment. Symptoms of muscle problems include:

- unexplained muscle pain or muscle pain that does not go away
- tenderness

· weakness



Call your healthcare provider right away if you get new or worsening signs and symptoms of muscle problems.

Increased uric acid level in your blood (hyperuricemia). AUGTYRO may cause an excess of uric acid in your blood. Your healthcare provider will do tests before and during your treatment with AUGTYRO to check the uric acid level in your blood. Your healthcare provider may prescribe medications if you have high blood uric acid levels. Tell your healthcare provider if you experience symptoms of increased uric acid, including:

- red, hot, tender, or swollen joints, especially in your big toe
- pain in your stomach-area or sides
- decrease in your amount of urine or no urine at all
- nausea or vomiting
- pink or brown urine or blood in your urine

Bone fractures. AUGTYRO may increase your risk for bone fractures. Bone fractures may happen with or without a fall or other injury.



Call your healthcare provider right away if you have pain, changes in movement, or bone abnormalities.

What should I discuss with my healthcare team before starting treatment?



Talk to your healthcare provider about all your medical conditions, including if you:

- have nervous system (neurological) problems
- have lung or breathing problems other than lung cancer
- · have liver or kidney problems



Talk to your healthcare team about all the medicines you are taking, including:

- prescription medicines
- · over-the-counter medicines
- · vitamins
- herbal supplements

Taking AUGTYRO with certain other medicines may:

- · affect the amount of AUGTYRO or other medicines in your blood,
- · cause side effects, and/or
- affect the way that AUGTYRO or other medicines work.

Know the medicines you take. Keep a list of them to show your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.

These are not all the topics you should discuss with your healthcare team. Discuss any questions you may have with your healthcare team.

What should I discuss with my healthcare team about pregnancy, birth control, and breastfeeding before starting treatment?



Talk to your healthcare team if:



You are pregnant or plan to become pregnant - AUGTYRO™ may harm your unborn baby

If you are able to become pregnant, your healthcare team should do a pregnancy test before you start treatment with AUGTYRO.

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If you are able to become pregnant, you should use effective non-hormonal birth control (contraception) during treatment and for 2 months after your last dose of AUGTYRO.

Birth control methods that contain hormones (such as birth control pills, injections, or transdermal system patches) may not work as well during treatment with AUGTYRO.



Talk to your healthcare team about birth control methods that may be right for you.



Call your healthcare provider right away if you become pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with AUGTYRO.

You are a male with a female partner who is able to become pregnant

You should use effective birth control during treatment with AUGTYRO and for 4 months after your last dose.



Call your healthcare provider right away if your partner becomes pregnant during treatment with AUGTYRO.



You are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed

Do not breastfeed during treatment and for 10 days after the last dose of AUGTYRO. It is not known if AUGTYRO passes into your breast milk. Talk to your healthcare team about the best way to feed your baby during this time.

What are the most common side effects of AUGTYRO?

The most common side effects of AUGTYRO include:

- Dizziness
- Change in sense of taste
- Feeling of numbness or tingling in your arms or legs
- Constipation

- Shortness of breath
- Tiredness
- · Trouble with balance. coordination, and walking
- Problems with thinking, such as forgetfulness or confusion, memory problems, and hallucinations
- Muscle weakness
- Nausea

How should AUGTYRO™ be taken?



Take AUGTYRO exactly as your healthcare provider tells you. The number of pills that you take will depend on your dose. Your healthcare provider may change your dose, temporarily stop, or permanently stop treatment with AUGTYRO if you develop side effects. Do not change your dose or stop taking AUGTYRO without first talking to your healthcare provider.

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AUGTYRO is a capsule with a white opaque cap and body, filled with a white to off-white powder. "REP 40" is printed in blue text on the cap.

Inactive ingredients: microcrystalline cellulose, sodium lauryl sulfate, croscarmellose sodium, and colloidal silicon dioxide.

Capsule coating inactive ingredients: gelatin and titanium dioxide.

Printing ink: shellac and FD & C blue #2 aluminum lake.

OR



AUGTYRO is a capsule with a blue opaque cap and body, filled with a white to off-white powder. "REP 160" is printed in white text on the cap.

Inactive ingredients: microcrystalline cellulose, sodium lauryl sulfate, croscarmellose sodium, magnesium stearate, and colloidal silicon dioxide.

Capsule coating inactive ingredients: gelatin and titanium dioxide.

Printing ink: shellac, titanium dioxide, and FD & C blue #1.

- ✓ Do take AUGTYRO with or without food
- ✓ Do take AUGTYRO at about the same time each day, such as in the morning or in the evening*
- ✓ Do swallow AUGTYRO capsules whole with water

*Setting an alarm clock or a calendar notification is a great way to remember to take medication.

- **Do not** open, crush, chew, or dissolve the capsule. **Do not** take broken, cracked, or damaged capsules
- **Do not** eat grapefruit or drink grapefruit juice during treatment with AUGTYRO
- ➤ Do not drive or operate machinery until you know how AUGTYRO affects you and you no longer have symptoms

What if I miss a dose of AUGTYRO?

If you miss a dose or vomit at any time after taking a dose of AUGTYRO, **do not take an extra dose.** Just skip the dose and take your next dose at the regularly scheduled time. Do not take 2 doses at the same time to make up a missed or vomited dose.

How do I store AUGTYRO?

AUGTYRO capsules should be stored at room temperature between $68^{\circ}F$ to $77^{\circ}F$ ($20^{\circ}C$ to $25^{\circ}C$). **Keep AUGTYRO and all medicines out of the reach of children.**
